The Grange is political but non-partisan; religious, but non-denominational; and is the only fraternal organization with lobbyists at the State and National Legislative levels.

## **The Grange**

The National Grange was founded soon after the Civil War in 1867 by Oliver Hudson Kelley, a Dept of Agriculture employee, journalist and farmer, along with six others who saw the need for supporting rural communities. At that time rural Americans were isolated and had grown discontent that industry and bureaucracy were advancing at the expense of our Nation's food and fiber producers.

The Grange is a national fraternal family organization for all. We welcome men and women from any and all backgrounds, educations, or occupations, and their children. Grange membership totals about 180,000 in 37 States and Washington D. C.

The Grange was the first fraternal organization to admit, *and specifically require the participation of,* women. A Community Grange cannot be organized without women. Four of the thirteen offices are designated to be held by women.

### Accomplishments

The Grange worked diligently and successfully for legislation to:

- regulate monopolies.
- provide rural free delivery of mail.
- promote food and fiber production.
- establish the Interstate highway system.
- develop University Extension programs.
- encourage vocational education in schools.
- ensure healthy food and fiber production.
- 4 H clubs originated in the Grange.

The Junior Grange Program is for children age 5 to 13 with specific state and national programs and contests appropriate to those ages.

# **Turkey Hill Grange**

### **Our 150 years of History**

About seven years after Oliver H. Kelley and his six co-founders started the Grange movement in the United States. Isaac Terrell held a meeting on April 9, 1874, at Mt. Pleasant School to organize a Grange in the Turkey Hill area. On April 17, 1874, Turkey Hill Grange was chartered with nineteen members -15 men and 4 women. The first meetings of Turkey Hill Grange were at the homes of the charter members. Later, Fred Helms offered the upper story of his home as a meeting place, and there they met until the first hall was built in 1885. Henry and Mary Eckert donated an acre of land to be used for a school and Grange purposes. Donations for the hall were by neighbors and Grangers. A June 25, 1886 letter states, "In the new Grange and school house they also hold church services. It is very nice, the number of Grangers is growing."

On Jan. 28, 1904, Turkey Hill Grange and school burned. A building committee quickly drew up plans for a second Grange hall. The first meeting in the new two-story frame structure with heat and kitchen was in November 24, 1904. The mortgage was paid in August 1921.

Ă fund for a new hall was started May 23, 1924. The last meeting in that second building was January 23, 1937 as it was torn down. The corner stone for the current hall was laid April 18, 1937 with the first meeting held July 19, 1937. The hall was to cost no more than \$11,000 but by completion the cost was \$18,103. To help pay the mortgage , a Wurstmarkt was held in November of 1938. This fund-raiser was so successful that it has continued every year since then, and today is a tradition of the community.

An elevator, four handicapped accessible restrooms, and a paved parking lot were added in 2004. Our dining room and St. Clair County Health Dept Certified kitchen were renovated in 2023.

### **Our Membership**

Turkey Hill Grange was founded by 19 local citizens in 1874. Our membership steadily reached over 100 around the turn of the century and during the 1950s had over 300 members. Turkey Hill Grange membership today is approximately 160.

#### Who are our Members?

Our Community Grange members are from essentially all professions and backgrounds.

While the foundation of the Grange was to meet the needs of rural and agricultural communities, today's Grange is engaged in all aspects of modern life such as rural health, internet connectivity and suicide prevention efforts.

Membership is growing as more and more individuals and families express concern for God's earth, family togetherness, patriotism, high moral and ethical values and helping others through community service.
