2024 Illinois State Grange JUNIOR DEPART-MENT Contests

All Junior Contests - Individual must be a Junior, or 1+ member

Three age groups: 5-7, 8-10, 11-14. Entry age as of 1/1/2024 (National Guidelines)

Any entry that is not labeled and does not follow rules may be disqualified from judging, but may still receive a participation ribbon.

Maximum size is given in measurements of length-bywidth-by-height

Mini-Juniors: Any child who is 5 by September 1, 2024 may send up to 3 entries to session. These projects will not be judged as other age groups are, but will receive participation ribbons.

Junior at Heart: Any Granger over the age of 20, as of September 1, 2024, may submit a project. These projects will be voted on by fellow Grangers for Best of Show.

Host State – Iowa

Small World - France

Make a 3-D display (Maximum size 10x10x8"high) or poster (up to 11x14" finished size after mounted for stability) which represents the country. Identify and explain at least three items of country.

Recycling-Old books

Make a project using old books and/or old pages.

Bible Stories - Esther

Make a poster, 3-D item, or give a 3-5 minute speech on something in the book of Esther.

Create a project out of clay.

Legislative report.

Hello brothers and sisters.

On April 10th and 11th, I attended the Legislative Briefing in Springfield as part of 2024 AG. Legislative Day. At this briefing we received reports from Senate President Don Harmon, Senate Republican Leader John F. Curran, House Speaker Emanuel "Chris" Welch, and House Republican Leader Tony M. McCombie. In my opinion there was little content to their presentations. All three sounded more like campaign speeches.

During the open discussion forum there were a good number of interesting topics discussed. The one that I thought pertained to Boone County the most was the discussion on Steer Tailing and how it pertained to Animal Cruelty. The Legislative Attorneys that were familiar with the subject, said under the law Steer Tailing constitutes Animal Cruelty, and therefore violates the Animal cruelty act.

We also discussed the responsibility for stopping said practice. The Attorneys stated that the responsibility fell solely in the Staes Attorney's office. When advised that the States Attorneys office had stated they couldn.t proceed without complaints, we were advised that was incorrect. They advised us that when a law was already in the books, as is Animal Cruelty, no complaint is required. The suspicion or knowledge of a violation of the law is all that is required for an investigation and if found to be factual, prosecution of said violation.

McHenry County, Will County, have both passed measures that will prevent Animal Cruelty and protect their counties from possible legal action. Ogle County is working on their possible actions. Winnebago County chose to go a different route, making the event sponsors and property owners buy permits for Food, Crafts, entertainment, liquor license, and Liquor Liability Insurance. God Bless to all from Marion and Jean.



April showers bring May flowers. The flowers and trees are all in full bloom now so they may not be here in May so we are enjoying them now. They are beautiful adding many beautiful colors.


